Unit 219 in Fruitland Park, recently held interviews with students from First Academy in Leesburg for ALA FL Girls State.




Diane Rousseau and Dara Oliver held interviews and found out that all four girls interviewed, were eligible for membership in the American Legion Auxiliary.

- Wear Purple to the Unit and District April Meeting take a picture, and let's flood our Facebook pages.



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REPORTING TIPS—LINDA KNOBLACH-HARKNESS

Reporting Tips For Efficient Strategies for Timely Submission—submitted by our 2024-2025 2nd Vice President and VA&R Chair—Linda Knoblach Harkness

It's that time again, reports are due to the District Chairmen no later than April 1st, and District Reports are due to Department Chairmen no later than April 15th. The timely submission of your reports is crucial. Delays can negatively impact both the District and the Department. If your unit report is late, it may not be included in the overall reports.

Here are a few tips that might make this task a bit easier.

1. Start Early

One of the most crucial tips for timely and efficient reporting is to start early. Gather all necessary documents and information well in advance. If you haven't already started collecting hours, dollar amounts, and mileage from your unit members, please begin now. You might need to contact your members to gather the necessary information. This will give you ample time to review, edit, and ensure accuracy before submission.

Benefits of Starting Early

- Avoiding last-minute stress
- Providing enough time for a thorough review
- · Ensuring accurate and complete information

2. Organize Your Data

Before you begin writing your report, organize all your data. Categorize the information into different sections. This will simplify the writing process and make the report easier to read and understand.

Steps to Organize Your Data

- Gather all relevant documents and information
- · Sort the data by category or section
- Create a checklist of required information

3. Use a Template

Using a pre-designed template can save you a lot of time and ensure that you do not miss any critical sections. Templates provide a structured format that you can follow, making the report-writing process more efficient. You can access the report templates at https://alafl.org/veterans-affairs/. Once there, click on the 'Reports and Plans' link. The questions are crafted in a narrative style, making reporting a breeze by highlighting the key points within the questions themselves. This approach not only simplifies the process but also ensures you capture all essential details effortlessly.

4. Be Clear and Concise

While it is important to provide detailed information, ensure that your report is clear and concise.

Tips for Clear and Concise Writing

- Use simple and direct language
- Avoid unnecessary words or phrases
- Break down complex information into smaller sections

5. Review and Edit

Once you have completed your report, take the time to review and edit it. Look for any errors or omissions and ensure that all information is accurate and complete. It can be helpful to have a fellow member review your report as well, to catch any mistakes you might have missed.

Steps for Effective Review and Editing

- Read through the report multiple times
- · Check for grammatical and spelling errors
- Ensure all data is accurate and complete
- Get feedback from a fellow member

6. Submit On Time

Finally, ensure that you submit your report on time. Late submissions can cause delays and complications. Mark the deadline on your calendar and set reminders to ensure that you do not miss it.

Strategies for Timely Submission

- Mark the deadline in your calendar
- Set reminders leading up to the deadline
- · Have all necessary documents ready in advance

In Conclusion

Reporting may seem like a daunting task, but with careful planning and organization, it can be manageable. Starting early, organizing your data, using a template, being clear and concise, reviewing your work, and submitting on time are key strategies to ensure a smooth reporting process. By following these tips, you can make your reporting task more efficient and stress-free.

Good luck, and remember, your efforts are crucial in maintaining the integrity of our work and helping the American Legion provide Congress with accurate reports on the VA&R program. Your contributions make a significant difference!

Data SPECIFIC TO VA&R to include and how it can be reported:

If a veteran who is a family member lives with you and you are a caregiver, you can report 10 hours per week. This data is crucial for understanding the scope of caregiving, as any additional support provided beyond what would be necessary if the veteran were able to fully care for themself. This includes family members who assist with daily activities such as bathing, dressing, medication management, and transportation to medical appointments.

If the veteran is a family member and does not live with a caregiver, the caregiver can report 5 hours per week. This helps in understanding the extent of caregiving provided, even when the caregiver does not reside with the veteran. This can include widows and widowers of veterans.

If the veteran, widow, or widower is not a family member, you should report all the hours, money spent, and mileage. Please include travel time and the time spent assisting the veteran.

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REPORTING TIPS—LINDA KNOBLOCH-HARKNESS

For example, preparing a meal would include going to the grocery store, cooking the meal, and delivering the meal. This comprehensive reporting helps capture the full extent of support provided. Did any of your unit members participate in making Comfort Articles such as lap robes, adult booties, caps, or kit bags? If so, the reporting should include \$5.00 per kit bag and \$25.00 per sewn lap robe. For hand-knitted or crocheted lap robes, report \$55.00 and up. Additionally, include the hours spent sewing, knitting, or crocheting the items. Include the time and the mileage for delivering the items.

Please incorporate pictures with captions in your report. The pictures must be in a high-resolution format such as JPG, JPEG, or TIF. Note that pictures from Facebook or other social media platforms cannot be used.

National Awards

If you would like to submit your unit for a National VA&R Award, please follow the instructions carefully when writing your report.

All award submissions must include a narrative (either a PDF or Microsoft Word Document) explaining why the Unit that you are nominating should win the award. You may also upload other supporting documentation that will give the committee a full picture of the important mission work your unit has done this year. These files can be photos (JPG, JPEG or TIFs -- not larger than 10MB) or PDF documents.


